Chapter Home Update

This spring semester has seen numerous projects that both improved the looks and comfortability of the house. As far as improving the looks, the brothers have taken on the task of fixing dead spots in the lawn by aerating and overseeding. We have also stained the new bullpen that was installed last semester.

Inside the house, the basement was fully painted, and many drywall repairs have been made throughout the house. To ensure the house is comfortable in the hot and cold months, all the exterior doors have been adjusted to seal better as well as completely replacing one of the basement doors.

Our House Cook, Cindy, was thrilled with the extra heat that was held in the house during the cold winter months. Fire Safety Improvements have also continued this semester, including adding exit signs to the remaining egress doors, electrical repairs, and having a fire drill.

Going into the summer, we will be replacing the basement flooring in preparation for the 95th Triangle Reunion in July. The house improvements will continue in Fall semester. As of right now, we plan to overhaul the Triangle Logo on the corner of the property, the wood features on the concrete pad, and potentially repaint the built-in grille.
